The Chief Operations Officer (COO) noted that a public bid opening was held on May 24, 2022. The COO and Projects Committee recommended awarding the contract to the lowest responsible bidder McLean Contracting Company of Glen Burnie, Maryland, in the amount of \$1,299,850.00.

Purpose of Resolution:

Authorizes expenditures of \$25,000 or greater with the identified vendors during the 2022 calendar year.

Background for Resolution:

The proposed Resolution meets the requirements of Resolution 01-84, whereby the Authority shall not enter into any contract committing the Authority to spend or make any other expenditures relating to services, material and supplies in the amount of \$25,000 or more unless it has first been approved by a vote of Commissioners.

Purchase Detail:

Adelte Ports and Maritime: Upgrades on Foot Passenger Ramps at CMLF

The Authority plans to upgrade the programable logic controller and gantry leveling systems for the existing foot passenger ramps in Cape May and Lewes. This upgrade will address operational issues connected to the reliability of the programmable logic controllers for the units and will eliminate leveling faults of the loading platforms directly adjacent to ferry vessel gates. Adelte is the sole source for this highly specialized equipment. The Authority currently contracts with Adelte for annual maintenance for the passenger boarding bridges at the CMLF terminals.

Bearing Distributors, Inc. (BDI): Capstan Units for CMLF Docking

The Authority plans to purchase and install one (1) new Capstan unit and upgrade one (1) existing Capstan unit to aid the docking of the ferry vessels at the Cape May terminal. BDI is the sole source manufacturer of this specialized equipment. The existing capstan units are no longer produced, this purchase is to fabricate new capstan units that meet the Authority's requirements.

Deere & Company c/o Central Jersey Equipment, LLC: Replacement Utility Vehicles

The Authority plans to replace three (3) grounds maintenance utility vehicles that have exceeded their useful life and meet the Authority's equipment replacement criteria. This purchase was previously authorized to Atlantic Tractor (local dealer) per state contract *GSS21673-GRNDMAINT*, however staff identified more competitive prices pursuant to cooperative contract (*ESCNJ 18/19-25*).

Delaware Bay Shipbuilding Co., LLC: Delafort Hull Repairs

In 2021, staff solicited quotes from three (3) companies to provide hull repairs on the passenger vessel Delafort, owned and operated by the Authority. The Delaware Bay Shipbuilding submitted the lowest quote for repairs required by the USCG Inspections Department. The project was split up between 2021 and 2022, the scope of work includes phase two of a three phase process to make repairs to the bottom plating of the vessel.

Dennisville Fence: Fence Replacement at Building M1601 at MIV

The Authority plans to remove and replace the existing fence at Building M1601 located at the Millville Airport. The fence line is being modified to allow unimpeded airfield access to the hangar for aviation use. Staff solicited quotes from four (4) contractors and received one (1) from Dennisville Fence in accordance with the Authority's specifications.

Mitten Construction: Gold Star Memorial Concrete Patio at DMB War Memorial

The Authority plans to install a concrete patio to provide pedestrian access to the Gold Star Memorial at the Delaware Memorial Bridge War Memorial Site. Staff solicited six (6) quotes and received five (5) with Mitten Construction submitting the lowest quote in accordance with the Authority's specifications.

Classification Definitions:

Cooperative Contract. A purchase of equipment, supplies or non-professional services which, under normal circumstances, would require competitive bidding, however the vendor has agreed to provide the goods or services to the Authority at fees less than or equal to that vendor's respective publicly-bid contract price for state and governmental entities. In accordance with Resolution 11-36, this purchase classification includes those "...purchases from cooperatives and/or the piggy-backing of existing publicly-bid contracts for state and governmental entities which State of Delaware or New Jersey may or may not individually publicly advertise".

Quotes. A purchase of equipment, supplies or non-professional services or a contract for construction or construction management that is anticipated to cost between \$25,000 and \$49,999 during a calendar year and for which the Authority has solicited written quotes. "Contracts for materiel and supplies and non-professional services, awarded to any [vendor for an amount of] more than \$25,000 but less than \$50,000 in the aggregate require the solicitation of three written quotes or all available sources, whichever is less... Construction management contracts or construction contracts... which are less than \$50,000 do not require formal solicitation of competitive prices and, if more than \$25,000 but less than \$50,000 require the solicitation of three written quotes or all available sources, whichever is less..." (DRBA Resolution 98-31 Part 4).

Sole Source. A purchase made without a competitive process, based on the justification that only one known source exists or that only one single supplier can fulfill the requirements of the Authority. Sole source procurement is appropriate when the goods or services being acquired: are uniquely qualified to meet the objectives of the Authority; must be compatible with existing equipment; are available within a limited geographic boundary (e.g., distributor with exclusive rights or sales area); are required for use in conjunction with a grant or contract, etc. "A contract may be awarded without competition if the General Manager or Director of Operations of an Authority facility, or Police Administrator, prior to procurement, determines in writing that there is only one source for the required contract and no other reasonable alternative sources exist that will satisfy the requirements of the Authority". (DRBA Resolution 98-31 Part 2.f.)

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RESOLUTION 22-25 – AUTHORIZES ACEPTANCE OF FUNDS FROM THE FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ADDITIONAL ASSISTANCE FUNDING GRANT PROGRAM

WHEREAS, The Delaware River and Bay Authority is a bi-state government agency with authority to operate and maintain public transportation; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Transit Administration has been delegated authority to award federal financial assistance for a public transportation project; and

WHEREAS, the Federal Transit Administration has granted The Delaware River and Bay Authority \$11,953,358 in Federal Transit Administration Grant funds as part of the American Rescue Plan to offset ferry service operating deficits attributed to COVID-19.

WHEREAS, notice of the award was made on March 23, 2022 on the Federal Transit Administration's website: https://www.transit.dot.gov/sites/fta.dot.gov/files/2022-03/FY21-American-Rescue-Plan-Additional-Assistance-Selections.pdf;and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Executive Director is hereby authorized to accept the disbursement of the funds from the Federal Administration grant and with the advice of counsel execute all documents related to the grant award.

Background for Resolution:

The Delaware River and Bay Authority operated the Cape May – Lewes Ferry at a substantial deficit during the Covid-19 pandemic. By way of notice on March 23, 2022, on the FTA's website, the Authority was awarded a grant totaling \$11,953,358 to offset this deficit as part of the American Rescue Plan.

<u>RESOLUTION 22-26 – AUTHORIZING A LEASE AMENDMENT WITH PENTURBO</u> AVIATION, INC. AT THE CAPE MAY AIRPORT

WHEREAS, the Delaware River and Bay Authority (the "Authority"), is the operator of the Cape May Airport ("Airport"), in New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, PenTurbo Aviation, Inc. ("PenTurbo") currently owns a Hangar and leases land and associated ramp space at the Cape May Airport; and

WHEREAS, PenTurbo has one (1), ten (10) year renewal term remaining on their Lease Agreement; and

WHEREAS, PenTurbo has decided to relocate their aircraft modification program and has requested to reduce the renewal term to two (2) years; and

WHEREAS, rent shall increase annually during the renewal term by the Consumer Price Index (CPI); and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Executive Director is hereby authorized to finalize the terms and conditions of the Lease Amendment with Pen Turbo Aviation, Inc. and, with the advice and consent of counsel, to have such Lease Amendment executed by the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and the Executive Director.

Background for Resolution:

Pen Turbo Aviation Inc. owns a hangar and office building at the Cape May Airport and has a land lease with the Airport for land that PenTurbo occupies with its hangar, office building and ramp space. They have been tenants at the airport since 1992. The company was sold recently. The new owner is looking to relocate the

operation to one of their other facilities out of state and has requested to reduce the remaining renewal term from 10 years to 2 years.

PenTurbo's business is to modify/convert Canadian built Caribou type aircraft from the original piston to turbine engine power and resell them to worldwide commercial cargo operators. Since 1992, they have delivered 3 aircraft. The remaining aircraft awaiting conversion are in various states of deterioration on the ramp. The DRBA is in favor of having these remaining aircraft removed along with the hangar building. PenTurbo occupies prime developable space on the airport with airside access which is desirable for future aviation development.

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RESOLUTION 22-27 - AUTHORIZES AN UTILITY EASEMENT AND A LEASE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE DELAWARE RIVER AND BAY AUTHORITY AND AT & T COMMUNICATIONS, INC. AND ITS AFFLIATES AT THE DELAWARE MEMORIAL BRIDGE

WHEREAS, the Delaware River and Bay Authority (the "Authority"), is the operator of the Delaware Memorial Bridge (the "Bridge"), New Castle, Delaware; and

WHEREAS, AT & T Communications, Inc. and its affiliates ("AT & T") currently has fiber on the bridge through an easement that has expired. AT & T would like to continue to access the bridge through a new Easement Agreement ("Easement") for their exiting fiber line; and

WHEREAS, AT & T would also like to enter into a Lease Agreement ("Lease") to lease space in underground conduit owned by the Authority that will extend the fiber line on the bridge to Route 130 in NJ and Route 9 in DE; and

WHEREAS, AT & T has agreed to pay the Authority annual rental for the easement of Twelve Dollars and 78/00 (\$12.78) per linear foot on the bridge; and

WHEREAS, AT & T has agreed to pay the Authority annual rental for Lease of One Dollar and 30/100 (\$1.30) per linear foot of conduit usage; and

WHEREAS, rent for both the easement and the lease agreement shall increase annually by two percent (2%); and

WHEREAS, the initial term of the Easement and Lease shall be for thirty (30) years; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Executive Director is hereby authorized to finalize the terms and conditions of the Easement and Lease Agreements with AT & T Communication, Inc and its affiliates and, with the advice and consent of counsel, to have such agreement executed by the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and the Executive Director.

Background for Resolution:

AT & T Communications, Inc. and its affiliates is upgrading and improving it communication network in the area. They currently have conduit installed and owned by ATT on the bridge. The easement agreement has expired, and they would like to renewal that agreement as well as enter into a new lease agreement to extend the fiber line to Routes 130 and 9. The rates are based upon appraisals and FMV comparable.

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RESOLUTION 22-28 – AUTHORIZES THE AMENDMENTS TO THE RESTATED DELAWARE RIVER AND BAY AUTHORITY EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT PLAN FOR PERMANENT FULL-TIME EMPLOYEES HIRED ON OR AFTER JANUARY 1, 2015

WHEREAS, the Delaware River and Bay Authority (the "Authority") currently maintains the Delaware River and Bay Authority Employees' Defined Benefit Retirement Plan (Amended and Restated 2014) (the "Retirement Plan"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 8.1(a) of the Retirement Plan, the Authority has the right to amend the Retirement Plan pursuant to a resolution of the Commissioners of the Authority; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 14-38 the Authority established Retirement Plan 2 to be effective for all permanent full-time employees who were hired on or after January 1, 2015, and

amended the Retirement Plan to reflect those changes, which included a new formula to be used to calculate the Normal Retirement Benefit of employees hired on or after January 1, 2015; and

WHEREAS, that formula is set forth in Section 5.1(a)(ii) of the Retirement Plan as follows:

For Employees hired on or after January 1, 2015, the amount of monthly retirement benefit to be provided for each Participant who retires on his Normal Retirement Date (which benefit is called his Normal Retirement Benefit) shall be equal to 1.5% of such Participant's Average Monthly Compensation, multiplied by such Participant's Years of Service.

; and

WHEREAS, the Authority desires to further amend Section 5.1(a)(ii) of the Retirement Plan, with such amendment being applied retroactively to January 1, 2015, for all existing and future permanent and full-time employees hired after that date by deleting the current Section 5.1(a)(ii) in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

For Employees hired on or after January 1, 2015, the amount of monthly retirement benefit to be provided for each Participant who retires on his Normal Retirement Date (which benefit is called his Normal Retirement Benefit) shall be equal to **1.75%** of such Participant's Average Monthly Compensation, multiplied by such Participant's Years of Service.

; and

WHEREAS, all other provisions of the Retirement Plan as stated in Resolution 14-38 remain unchanged; and

WHEREAS, the proposed amendment has been reviewed by the Personnel Committee and found to be appropriate.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Delaware River and Bay Authority hereby approves deleting Section 5.1(a)(ii) of the Retirement Plan in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

For Employees hired on or after January 1, 2015, the amount of monthly retirement benefit to be provided for each Participant who retires on his Normal Retirement Date (which benefit is called his Normal Retirement Benefit) shall be equal to 1.75% of such Participant's Average Monthly Compensation, multiplied by such Participant's Years of Service.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that numbered paragraph 3 of Resolution 14-38 is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

3. Any permanent full-time employee hired on or after January 1, 2015 will become vested in Retirement Plan 2 after ten (10) years of service. Pension benefits will be

calculated based on 1.75% of the average base salary for the three (3) highest consecutive years multiplied by years of service. Employees will be required to contribute 3% of base salary to said Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the proper officers and employees of the Authority are hereby authorized to execute the necessary amendments to the Retirement Plan and to take whatever action to execute whatever instruments with the advice and consent of General Counsel that may be necessary or convenient to carry out the foregoing resolution.

Background for Resolution:

The Delaware River and Bay Authority has had the Employees' retirement plans since June 1, 1963.

It is the responsibility of the Authority to frequently review the benefits offered to current and future permanent full-time employees. To be fiscally responsible and to implement practices found in other public sector companies, the Authority has decided to revise the Authority's retirement plan for permanent full-time new and rehired employees hired on January 1, 2015, and beyond.

The proposed revision in the pension plan formula revises that stated in Resolution 14-38 (copy attached).

RESOLUTION 22-29 - AUTHORIZES AN UTILITY EASEMENT BETWEEN THE DELAWARE RIVER AND BAY AUTHORITY AND THE LOWER TOWNSHIP MUNICIPAL UTILITIES AUTHORITY (LTMUA) AT THE CAPE MAY FERRY

WHEREAS, the Delaware River and Bay Authority (the "Authority"), is the operator of the Cape May Lewes Ferry (the "Ferry"), Cape May, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, Lower Cape May Regional High School ("LCMR HS") is in need of a connection to the LTMUA's public water service. LCMR HS is currently served by two private wells, one of which has failed and the second is failing and there is currently no existing backup water service available. LCMR HS has passed an emergency resolution to authorize the connection to public water service; and

WHEREAS; LTMUA has passed an emergency resolution that authorizes a \$2.5 million expenditure to construct an extension to provide LCMR HS with public water service; and

WHEREAS, LTMUA desires an easement from the Authority to run parallel to the Cape May Ferry approach road for a portion of the extended water service; and

WHEREAS, the easement will be 15' wide. A final survey, metes and bounds and legal description will be provided; and

WHEREAS, the granting of said easement shall not interfere with or be detrimental to the future use of the property; and

WHEREAS, the Authority desires to enter into an easement with the LTMUA to formalize the parties' rights and obligations with respect to the LTMUA's easement through the Authority's property; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Executive Director is hereby authorized to finalize the terms and conditions of the Easement Agreement with the Lower Township Municipal Utilities Authority, with the advice and consent of counsel, to have such agreement executed by the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and the Executive Director.
